A thirst for learning is:

- Being curious and showing a desire to learn more.
- Being passionate about your subject.
- Taking risks and having fun in the classroom.
- Is planning ambitious lessons that don't limit students and allow them to drive their own learning.

A thirst for learning is not:

- Simply about students having fun (although this is a good start!) but also helps them to become highly effective learners.

What evidence of 'A thirst for learning' might we see in a lesson or in student books?

- Students are actively engaged in their work
- Students ask inquisitive questions
- Students aren't completely dependent on the teacher and don't always wait to be told what to do next
