## Independent Study (10+ hours a fortnight expected)

## 25 Mark Essay Marking

5 marks AO1 – Knowledge

- Suitable detailed examples to illustrate knowledge and understanding.
- Knowing and understanding what the features are.
- Introduction paragraph should establish key features.
- Each paragraph of the essay should start with one new point being made (for or against the statement).

10 marks AO2 – Analysis

- Suitable detailed examples to help identify key features and support analysis.
- Synoptic links made to show understanding of other areas of the course.
- Well organised and coherent i.e. the answer has a structure and all progresses to answer the question.
- Information and arguments are balanced (i.e. both sides are explained).

10 marks AO3 – Evaluation

- Suitable detailed examples to support evaluation and illustrate strengths and weaknesses.
- Introduction should set up evaluation by explaining possible interpretations of the question.
- Conclusion should be sophisticated, well thought out, consistent with the arguments and evidence in the essay and show understanding of both sides of the argument (does not have to be neutral).
- Arguments should be evaluated throughout the essay by assessing each argument and where possible contrasting
  opposing points.
