





The Art and Photography department have got off to a productive start this Autumn term, with both GCSE and A-Level being able to participate in trips relevant to their coursework.



Our after school club has produced some lovely work using watercolours and pastels and has also made natural colour wheels with beautiful coloured leaves and petals found on the school grounds.








### Cooking & Nutrition and Hospitality & Catering

### Science Trips to CERN and Syngenta

The physics trip to CERN (the Europen Organisation for Nuclear research), Geneva on Wednesday I2th October did not disappoint. On Wednesday evening we dined at a traditional Swiss restaurant to live alphorn, bell ringing and yodelling as we ate cheese fondue. A walk by Lake Geneva was breathtaking on our way back to the hostel. Then on Thursday morning, we arrived at Geneva station hoping to hop onto a tram to CERN. Unfortunately, the tram drivers were on strike but by a stroke of luck a CERN education officer spotted us looking bemused and he was able to arrange for our safe passage to CERN via a different route.



The highlights of our tour around CERN were seeing the Control Room where the four key experiments are operated from. You could see the two dots on one of many large screens, showing the two beams of particles being accelerated at II,000 times per second around the 27km LHC ring - now that is fast! Next was a bus ride to the ALICE detector and although it was not open underground, we got to see part of an old detector built by a global team of engineers and physicists which is looking at modelling events just after the big bang. Amazing! There was just enough time to visit the CERN shop of course for a memento of an unforgettable visit before catching a train back to Geneva in a double-decker carriage that also impressed many of us. My thanks to Clare Agate, Andrew Kishkar and the Year I3 students themselves.



Syngenta is a global agrochemical company at Jealott's Hill and many of the Year 13 chemists took the opportunity to visit it on Wednesday 9th November. An excellent schedule had been arranged. After a brief introduction about the company, we were split into two groups, donned with lab coats and goggles and whisked away to visit four scientific areas. Our guide demonstrated equipment in the synthesis labs and showed us how magnets are used to see the structure of molecules in the Analytical Lab with amazing devices. Students were interested in the workings of the Process Department and a large robot in the Artemis Lab runs day and night and looked very futuristic.

This was a jam-packed 3-hour visit to a company we are lucky to have on our doorstep and the students were suitably impressed by their welcome. Many thanks to Clare Agate and the Year 13 students.

### **Social Sciences**

Social Sciences have had visitors from The University of Reading Outreach Team who have delivered informative and practical sessions to students in Years 10, 11 and 13. The sessions have included topics on physiological conditions such as Parkinson's disease where the students were able to wear a special suit that simulated the feelings experienced by individuals with the condition such as tremors. The Year 10 students were able to participate in some tests that measure heart rate, and blood pressure, and got to play on an iPad which allowed the students to see in an interactive way how the body systems work.

The Year 12 Social Sciences students went to see 'The Psychology of Serial Killers'. This was an opportunity to listen to a forensic psychology lecturer discussing the fascinating yet troubling topic of the psychology of a serial killer. They heard about the differences in serial



killer classifications and explored examples such as Fred and Rose West and the Moors Murders.

#### Assemblies and Presentations

We have held a few assemblies and presentations this term including one from Boyer Planning for Year 10, and for Year 11 on their Options Post-16, Apprenticeships and from the Activate College Group. All assemblies and presentations are available on the school website so students and parents/carers can view them.

Adviza is in school every week, and all Year IIs will attend a careers guidance appointment either in a group session or on a 1:2:1 basis to further support their decision-making process. There have also been opportunities for some Sixth Form students and Year 9s to have appointments at key transition times. Some of you will have taken advantage of the appointments that have been available with a careers coach from Adviza at Student Progress Evenings. There will be further appointments available next term at the Year 9 and 12 evenings on a first-come, first-served basis.



Parents/carers and students can also access the Adviza Careers Portal, where you will find lots of information to enable you to support your child's career journey. The home tab has links for students, parents/carers, and events (where you can register to attend employer events) as well as a webchat facility.

Our annual careers convention will take place on Thursday 9th March 2023 and we have 49 exhibitors confirmed to date. The week commencing 6th March 2023 is National Careers Week #NCW and we will be looking to hold a week of careersrelated assemblies.

Year 10s will have a mock interview with a member of the local business community in late March and they will be working on their CVs in school soon. Again, if any parent/carer could support the programme, or their employers can please do get in touch.

### **Other News**

### Morgan Rec Update

Crowthorne Parish Council has been awarded a community safety partnership grant to provision detached youth work services in Crowthorne from November 2022 until March 2025. The service will be provided one evening a week by The Wayz, from Bracknell.



The Parish Council has chosen The Wayz to provide the service in the hope that the detached youth workers can work closely with the youth worker based on-site at Edgbarrow. It is hoped that in this way, there will be effective lines of communication between the parish council, school and other stakeholder organisations who have been involved in helping the parish council to fund and commission the service.

Crowthorne continues to suffer with considerable antisocial behaviour and Thames Valley Police have now identified the Morgan Recreation Ground as a priority policing area to try and help us tackle antisocial behaviour. We have been fortunate to have input from the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner (OPCC), Bracknell Forest Council's antisocial behaviour team, Crowthorne Hopezone and Royal Berks Fire and Rescue Service (RBFRS), in drafting the bid and defining the commissioning model. Without input from all of these agencies, we would have been unable to secure the bid.

The Wayz will bring their youth workers into the parks and open spaces in Crowthorne, in a sign-written minibus. RBFRS has indicated that The Wayz will also be able to pre-book the



community room at the Fire Station, so there is a warm, dry drop-in space for youth workers and young people if the weather is bad.

Please be aware that the youth workers will try to engage with young people. The youth workers are all recruited in line with safer recruitment practices, safeguarding trained, DBS checked and trained to deliver outreach services in communities. They will have clear identification and clothing with The Wayz branding so they are clearly identifiable to the public and young people.

The parish council has also, recently, passed a resolution to regenerate the old basketball court at the far end of the Morgan Recreation Ground with:

- multi-marked hardcourts which will be freely accessible for netball, basketball and five-a-side football
- an assault course and calisthenic bars to provide age-appropriate recreational equipment for young people
- a walking/running track (phase two of the project).

This range of equipment was chosen following extensive consultation (including with Edgbarrow students), so should encourage more positive and engaging activities for young people.

# **Absence Reporting**

In routine matters of absence, we would be grateful if parents would contact the school before 8.30am ON EACH DAY OF ABSENCE if a student is going to be away. If your child has a medical appointment that interrupts their school day, please ensure that we are also made aware of this.

The school has a dedicated telephone line and email address specifically for absence reporting. Please note that the telephone number is only able to take messages and you will not be able to speak to a member of staff. The telephone number is: 01344 467675, alternatively, please email the school (absence@edgbarrowschool.co.uk) on each day of absence.

If we do not have a reason for a student's absence, under our First Day Response system contact will be made with home.

If a child becomes ill whilst at school they will be looked after until such time as the child is able to return home. The school does have fully qualified First Aiders who can provide medical assistance where necessary. Contact will also be made with the parents as rapidly as possible. In an emergency, an ambulance may be called to take the child to the hospital, but treatment cannot usually begin until a parent gives consent. We respectfully ask that if your child has a minor ailment (e.g. cold or cough) that they attempt a day in school. Our school First Aid team will make contact with you to arrange for you to collect your child if they feel that they are not well enough to be in school. Alternatively, quiet spaces can be provided for your child to work in.

Permission will not be given for family holidays during term time. Any request for Leave of Absence should be made using the form on our website, (Leave of Absence Request Form) which is also available from Reception. Any absence during term time has a detrimental effect on learning and social interactions. Students with poor attendance may be invited to an Attendance Action Plan meeting or be required to provide medical evidence for any absence or appointment, in consultation with the Education Welfare Service.
