When we plan our development work, we always try to keep in mind our school's vision of Enjoy, Grow, Achieve. Of course, lessons are hugely important but this newsletter gives you a flavour of the wider curriculum and hopefully lots of enjoyment. There's been a huge amount of activity in PE and we were delighted to host a festival of Football celebrating the growth in girls' football, supported by Reading Football Club. We have also just finished our school production of Grease. A huge cast and crew representing all year groups. I watched the show on Friday night and am always amazed at the performances and special talent we get to see. My thanks to everyone involved and to our families for their support. Philosophy, Ethics & Religion

We are delighted that the Philosophy, Ethics and Religion course is moving to become a core GCSE subject at Edgbarrow from September 2024. This means our current Year 7 and 8, as well as future students will have the opportunity to take GCSE in Philosophy, Ethics and Religion. Students will start studying towards their GCSE at the start of Year 9 and will take their exam in May of Year 10. This means students will get the benefit of revising for a single exam and honing their revision skills in preparation for further exams in Year 11. Philosophy, Ethics and Religion is a highly academic subject, which will allow students to practice their skills of analysis, evaluation and problem-solving as well as provide a brilliant opportunity to engage with key cultural, social, ethical and spiritual issues. We look forward to welcoming and supporting current Year 8 students onto their GCSE course next academic year.

On Monday 19th February, the Philosophy, Ethics and Religion department was delighted to receive a visitor from the 'Society of Friends', otherwise known as 'Quakers'. Naomi Illif, from the Reading Quaker community, presented to 40 Year 10 students on what religion means to her; most notably mentioning the differences between Quaker worship and that of other traditional Christian denominations. Topics varied widely from the 'Nature of God' to 'the appropriateness of forgiveness'. Students behaved brilliantly, listened attentively and asked some fantastic questions, balancing at times on the tightrope of critical questioning while still behaving respectfully at all times.



On Friday 15th March, our Year 7 HAT (Highest Ability and Talented) students got the opportunity to take part in a mindfulness experience, led by Mr Marshall. Students were able to engage in critical reflection on what it means to 'be present in the here and now.' The Tea Ceremony is a Zen Buddhist meditation technique that is practised in order to think deeply about the meaning of life and how best to live it. It is usually a shared experience between people discussing the Buddha's teachings and drinking tea. A part of the ceremony involves the host consciously reflecting on the art of making tea, of living in and focusing on the present moment. The shared experience of drinking tea and discussing is valued in Buddhism as a way to practice mindfulness. The Tea Ceremony is a reminder that even the most mundane activities can become useful ways of meditating, reflecting and living life in the present moment without worrying about the past or future.

Why it's not just about the numbers!

On Wednesday 24th January, Andy Penfold, Business Development Manager for PKB Accountants Limited hosted a talk and Q&A about the realities of decision



making in finance to a group of our Year 12 and 13 Business students. He looked at the tensions between short-term and long-term decision-making, revenue vs costs and the extent to which firms have to look beyond the numbers alone. Using some real-world case studies, he helped the student's development of critical thinking about financial tools. He was an engaging and charismatic speaker.

Andy is a former Edgbarrow student, he has been working with PKB Accountants since leaving school (about 40 years ago) and was their first ever Junior Accounts Clerk. Andy works with SME clients who have been known to refer to him as "the fifth emergency service" due to his experience in helping and advising this client group. His role is varied from accounting and auditing to teaching bookkeeping. Andy is particularly customer-focused and enjoys helping his clients succeed. Away from the office, Andy enjoys a

Attendance & Absence

In routine matters of absence, we would be grateful if parents would contact the school before 8.30am ON EACH DAY OF ABSENCE if a student is going to be away. We need DAILY notification of your child's absence to ensure they are safe. Failure to provide a reason for absence will result in an unauthorised mark being applied. If your child has a medical appointment that interrupts their school day, please ensure that we are also made aware of this.

The school has a dedicated telephone line and email address specifically for absence reporting. Please note that the telephone number is only able to take messages and you will not be able to speak to a member of staff. If we do not have a reason for a student's absence, under our First Day Response system contact will be made with home.

If a child becomes ill whilst at school they will be looked after until a parent/carer can collect them from school. In an emergency, an ambulance may be called to take the child to the hospital, but treatment cannot usually begin until a parent gives consent. MEDICATION IN SCHOOL If it is necessary for students to take any medication in school (including non-prescription medicines), the medication and a signed consent form (this form can also be downloaded from the school website) must be handed in at Reception where it will be stored safely. The student must come to the medical room at the required time to report to the First Aider before taking the medication.
