Character Education



Character Education is a facet of Personal Development that Edgbarrow School provides as part of our students' education experience. At Edgbarrow we deliver a broad curriculum, including PSHE, and through this and the other experiences that we offer our students we are allowing them to learn about themselves and develop their characters. Character is a complex concept with a number of overlapping facets.

The DfE has identified four important aspects, which inform the way schools develop their character education provision:

- The ability to remain motivated by long-term goals, to see a link between effort in the present and pay-off in the longer-term, overcoming and persevering and learning from setbacks when encountered.
- The learning of positive moral attributes, including courage, honesty, generosity, integrity, humility and a sense of justice.
- Developing social confidence and the ability to make points or arguments clearly and constructively, listen attentively to the views of others, behave with courtesy and good manners and speak persuasively to an audience.
- Have an appreciation of the importance of long-term commitments which frame a successful and fulfilled life, helping individuals to put down deep roots and gain stability in their lives.

Character education is embedded at Edgbarrow School through assemblies, subject lessons, dedicated character education lessons during tutor time, sports, performance and arts clubs, outward bound activities, hobby clubs, subject learning club and co-curricular activities. These opportunities help young people to explore and express their character and build the skills they need for resilience, empathy and employability. Each half term, we will ask students to think about different ways in and outside school they can develop key values and evaluate their own personal targets. During the Autumn term, the focuses are courtesy, volunteering, teamwork and Leadership. There have already been so many ways to volunteer, whether as Form Rep, Peer Mentor or helping out at Open Evening. At the end of each half term, every tutor and Head of Year will name a half term character star.

PSHE at Edgbarrow

Students are taught PSHE by their form tutor once a fortnight at Edgbarrow. Students will cover three units over each year, these are; Living in the Wider World, Health and Wellbeing, and Relationships. Throughout these core themes students are able to explore ideas and issues that they will experience in life, preparing and equipping them to make good decisions. To do this, students are exposed to scenarios, videos, debates and group work allowing them to share ideas and become informed and conscientious citizens. PSHE is supported by assemblies and tutor activities where understanding is developed and consolidated. PSHE is further supported by Bracknell Forest run workshops, with a focus on substance misuse and sexual health, AlterEgo Creative Solutions, performances that focus on sexual harassment and child sexual exploitation.

What PSHE resources do we use?

As a school we use a variety of resources to inform and support our planning and teaching of PSHE. Below are some examples of the resources and how we have used them in school.

<u>PSHE Association</u> - The PSHE association provides a wide range of resources and training that is key in supporting our planning and teaching of PSHE at Edgbarrow. The association provides high quality lesson resources, particularly on Mental Health and Drugs and Alcohol education, reflecting the new RSE (Relationships and Sex Education) framework. The association also gives us access to other PSHE association approved resources which we regularly use. An example of this is Med Way resources which provide lessons focused on RSE.

<u>Bank of England</u> - The Bank of England have produced great resources to help students better understand the economy. So far, we have used these resources with Year 8 and look forward to using more of these ideas with other year groups in the future.

Child Line - Child Line provide great factual information which is used to support our preparation for teaching PSHE.

PSHE this term

This term students in Years 7-10 are covering the theme 'Living in the Wider World', Year 11 start by considering post-16 options, then move onto 'Relationships and Health and Wellbeing'. Through these topics students will consider a series of age-appropriate topics preparing them for life in the world.

Online Safety

You may be aware from the news of the recent findings in the Molly Russell case. Please find below more information.

Molly Russell was a London teenager, "full of love, and hope, and happiness". She died in 2017. The harrowing conclusion of the coroner at the inquest into her death was that "She died from an act of self-harm whilst suffering from depression and the negative effects of online content." The fact that the inquest found "unsafe online content contributed in a more than minimal way" to her death is significant for online safety.

The NSPCC has lots of advice around online safety, including what to do if children come across inappropriate content online and how to talk to your child about online safety. Talking regularly with children allows them to discuss anything they find online that makes them feel uncomfortable. Discussing issues early and often is a key part of online safety, before problems are magnified. For children growing up with technology, the online world is part of their daily lives; we should ask children about their online experiences the same way we ask about the rest of their day at school.

To keep our children safe online the NSPCC recommends these steps when setting up social media accounts:

- Follow age-appropriate accounts. Spend time looking at appropriate content together, as this will help shape what your child sees in the future.
- Together, explore the settings and filters in your child's favourite apps.
- Consider settings on shared devices, as accounts and devices can show content related to other material viewed on the same device.

Safeguarding

As part of ensuring our students are kept safe, this term we are having safeguarding assemblies that cover a range of topics to support students' understanding of how to keep themselves safe such as sexual harassment, PREVENT and Children's Criminal Exploitation. We want students to feel confident in recognising risk situations and be able to report this to the appropriate body/person.

Please look out for our IMABI app and encourage students to download it. The app aims to support students with their wellbeing and signpost them to any support they may need, along



with offering a function where students can report concerns direct to the school's safeguarding team should they wish.



Student Survey Feedback

Student reflections on school – Throughout last year, students took part in a survey reflecting on different areas of the school. This was to help inform us on how we can continue to support our students. Below are some statistics which reflect their responses.

- **Pride in school** 98% know and believe in the school values; Ready Respectful Safe and Positive. 92% believe our school celebrates diversity and inclusion.
- Understanding how I learn 93% believe they try their best even if they find work hard, showing resilience.
- Quality of education 90% say their lessons are enjoyable.
- Behaviour and Bullying 94% believe they are taught to be kind to people at this school.
- Inclusion and equal opportunities 92% said the school teaches what diversity means and 92% understood this key concept.
- Personal Development 96.4% believe there is an excellent range of co-curricular activities.
- Safeguarding and keeping healthy 100% of students said they feel safe in school and 93% said they are taught about sexual harassment.
- Environment 88% believe our actions in the local community impact the reputation of the school. 84% believe more needs to be done for us to be considered an environmentally friendly school

Careers

We would like to reiterate that students should explore their options fully including visiting other educational establishments to ensure that they are making the correct choice and should aim to have a first and back-up choice.

First Aid

It's been wonderful to welcome back students this term and see plenty of new faces. At this time of year common colds run wild! It would be worth remembering that everybody will catch around two colds a year. A cold is an infection in the upper respiratory tract and symptoms will include runny or blocked nose, sore throat, mild headache, loss of appetite and muscle aches. It is best to rest when you can and remember to keep warm, drink plenty and eat as normal.

The video mentions CPR and that sometimes defibrillators are also required. Edgbarrow School is lucky enough to have a defibrillator on site. When the school is open, we are able to access this. The Student Support Department

The Student Support Department works alongside any student that may be experiencing a social, emotional or behavioural difficulty. We provide high quality contact between the school and the home, working in partnership with parents/carers to support students in overcoming their barriers to learning.

Support is offered with Heads of Year in agreement. Targeted support is accessed through 1:1 mentoring, group work and behaviour improvement programs. Referrals to outside agencies are supported through us; ensuring students access the correct support for their needs.

Transition from primary school is aided and early intervention from Student Support through the peer mentor program enables Year 7 students to settle quickly and achieve their full potential. The range of issues we address are wide and varied.

They include bereavement, stress, school refusal, substance misuse, conflict resolution, mental health issues, anger management, family breakdown and self esteem.


